Intro

The theme today is Love

But the readings offered do not seem to give a handle on the definition of Love

Unlike some other readings like 1 Cor 13, or 1 John

Which seem to be all about love

So how can we do this?

Isaiah 42 or 43?

I based this on Isaiah 43

Which is the less familiar one!

How does society define and measure love

Perhaps here a dictionary answer may be appropriate

And that is quite difficult

Oxford English Dictionary (OED) gives seven answers for the meaning of

Senses related to affection and attachment

Taking love of games of skill or chance

seperate
A feeling or disposition of deep affection or fondness for someone
2. the benevolence and affection of God towards an individual or towards creation;
3. Strong predilection, liking, or fondness of, or devotion to
4. An intense feeling of romantic attachment based on an attraction felt by one person for another
5. Sexual desire or lust
6. A person who is beloved of another
7. The personification of romantic or sexual affection, more or less identified with the Eros, Amor, or Cupid of Classical mythology
The secular concept of love is not easy to define
That's why there are so many movies, novels, plays about love
And how we mistake it
How we fail to express it
How it is not returned
How it can turn to anger or even hate
How does God's word define
love?

In the bible the word or concept of love is often restricted to Grek term Agape

It is not familial, romantic or between friends

It is love that is formed out of a decision

It is not an emotion

which is the OEDs version

It is an act of someone's will

Challenges?

That is often defines the life of a Christian

Loving someone you do not like

Loving to do something you do not want to do

And not used as being friendly to them, but by really helping them or forgiving them, and interacting with them

That is quite hard - for all of us

It is the basis of the 10 commandments

And we find that we still cannot do this by ourselves Where do Isaiah 43 and Luke 2:21-40 intersect That is not so easy They do not seem to refer to each other But still there is a theme Isaiah 43 speaks about the love of God for the people of Israel The first part: 1-7 speaks about the Love of God **Actions** Israel is God's creation Israel is redeemed by God Israel is protected by God God would exchange other nations, like Egypt, Ethiopia and Seba for Israel Israel is precious and honoured in God's sight Israel does not need to feaer God will bring Israel together again even after it has been scattered Israel has made for God's glory

God would love to see Israel's love to him returned! By praising him! He gives them everything So at least they can praise him? So Part 4 (v22-24) speaks about that Israel has not loved God, has not returned his love Yet, you did not call upon me But you have been weary of me ^ v22 Israel has not honoured God Not even the sacrificial system they could bother to keep in place even if God did not required that ^ v23 Like the other so called gods Instead they have sinned, and made God tired by all the things they have done wrong Then Part 5 (v25-28) God calls them to a trial Why did you not love me! I have always forgiven you Yes, I punished your ancerstors And then it carries on in Chapter 44 He continues to reassure Israel That he will redeem them

As he is the Almighty God There is no one like him Love letter The whole section reads like a love letter of a lover, who has done everything for his beloved But who has spurned her lover She took all the benefits But not wanting to love the lover back Cost This is a love that is costly Costly for God Look how much he has invested in his people And they have not returned his love Luke 2:21-40 We are already after Christmas Jesus is named, circumcised and presented in the temple All the required statutes of the law are fulfilled Luke is very clear to stress that Jesus comes from a proper Jewish family, adhering to the law But wherever Jesus goes, the Spirit goes with him

And the Spirit stirs people to make proclamations about Jesus Zechariah speaks about the consolation of Israel Comfort o Comfort my people [△] Isa 40·1-2 The HS has told Zecharia that he would see the messiah, the comforter Anna speaks about Jesus will bring the redemption of Israel We do not hear her words But Luke summarises it in that way Zechariah also speaks about that Jesus will also be a light of revelation to the Gentiles Bringing glory to the people of Israel But also extending God's love to outside of Israel But Zechariah also indicates that there will be cost In the form of judgement Jesus will raise up people, but also bring people down He will be opposed And the true nature and thoughts of people will be revealed And this will cause pain. Pain to Mary harealf Rut also nain to others

As well as pain to God

The cost of love

So the intersection of the two passages is about the cost of love

How much it has cost God to love his people, even if his people do not return his love

In Isaiah 40 we see what it cost God to love the people of Israel

In Luke we see that the live of Jesus as consoler and redeemer of Israel is also costly

For God as his Son will be rejected again

Not only by Israel, but by all the people We see the hints of the cost of Jesus live, death and ressurrection hinted at

When we speak about love, do we speak about the cost of love?

Because when Love is a decision, it also has a cost

Like it is hard for God, who loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal live

But there is then also a cost to love God

Not only in our times of worship

But in our daily lives

To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly or prudently

with justice your God

A Micah 6:8

We cannot accept the cost of Love that God, that Jesus has spend for us

By not returning it to him Yes, salvation is free

Except to love God back, with all our heart, soul and mind

34 "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. ³⁵ For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, ³⁶ I needed
