Last special Lent Service

Next week the Dunamis team will lead the service

And quite a few are also members of St Andrews!

This is a service about commitment

We will celebrate Holy Communion together

But this is also a commitmentment

But first we looking at one of the seven letters of Christ to the Seven Churches in Asia

These form the introduction to the rest of Revelations, which contains visions of the battle between God and Evil

And these letters prepare the churches for the upcoming ordeal but that through the cross of Jesus Christ, God and these churches will be victorious

As long as they are prepared for it

So each church is listed with a warning and something good about them

except Laodicea With the challenge to change and focus more on Jesus Laodicea Laodicea as a city was a rich city It was a banking centre They manufactured renowned cloths and carpets f from a special glossy-black wool produced in the vicinity Also known for its medical school, noted for its ear-ointment and eye salve latter made of "Phyrgian powder" A very prosperous town and therefore a very prosperous church Water was a problem But they did not have a good water source In between two cities In the North Collosea had clean refreshing cold springs In the South Hierapolis had healthy hot springs Both are useful But Laodiceas water was brought by an 6 miles aquaduct and because of the water was hot nor cold But tepid, lukewarm Not pleasant to drink or to wash in

because of its temperature it carried diseases so was not save to drink Hot is good, Cold is good But lukewarm - undrinkable The Church of Laodicea So Christ uses these attributes of the city to also describe its church They regarded them as the best of the best Rich, prosperous in the need of nothing They had gold and clothing They had medication, and doctors But Jesus looks at their spiritual health In that regard they are poor and wretched He challenges then to store treasures up in Heaven "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal" [△] Matt 6:19 To buy his gold and his white robes instead of relying on their own And then Jesus says these famous words: Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me. They can still change, they can still accept Jesus in the life of their church

In order to prepare themselves for the

upcoming ordeal, which is coming: The next section reads: After this I looked - and John's visions change to the heaven and world stage This is their warning Listen, Jesus said, take heed of the warning St Andrews What does this passage mean for us? 1. This passage is written to a whole church Not individuals although we have to respond individually as well But the whole Laodicean Church was lukewarm 2. Are we rich? We may not be rich in secular terms We have members that are quite well off, and we have members that are not so well off Our bank balance is healthy, but not abundant But we are rich, because of the beautiful building Nice, modern and new Not a lot of maintenance and care issues

-	A lot of churches that I worked with are struggling with their buildings
	It takes a lot of energy of the members and elders to look after and maintain the building
	The larger ones in Canterbury even meet in Schools!
	We are rich as we are able to employ an administrator
	And thanks to Alice what work does need to be done is handled by her
L	And she does a brilliant job as well!
	We are rich because we have the Oasis café
	Yes, it takes a lot of work to do
L	But it is a brilliant place of outreach
